

Throughout these difficult times the staff of the Lighthouse Schools Partnership have been getting on with our jobs in a characteristically business-like way. Every time that I have been on a school site I have been overwhelmed by the normality of the experience for the pupils, despite all the changes that we have had to make. Your hard work and spirit of public service have meant that, by and large, the 'ordinary magic' of learning has been able to do its work. Our belief that school is the best place for young people has been emphatically confirmed and we have perhaps made a greater difference now than ever before.

Many of our headteachers have shared with me messages from parents and neighbours that pay tribute to the work that you have been doing. I hope that this public recognition is getting through to you too. We do not ask for it but when our communities notice the additional hours, the quality of our online provision and our personal commitment to children it is tremendously motivating.

One other area that has been lit up by the challenges of the pandemic is our network of professional skills. The workload and additional complications of making sites and systems COVID safe has been enormous. We all recognise that no child can learn in a school if the site is not open, clean and safe and the IT, financial and administrative systems fully working. Our caterers and some of our other contractors have also gone far beyond the extra mile in responding to the crisis. For teachers and teaching assistants the classroom has been an even more demanding place than ever. It has been absolutely remarkable to see our huge team adapting and working so brilliantly together and our schools engaging in such deep partnership. If we have ever taken this for granted before, I hope that we never do so again.

For our headteachers, the team ethic of the Trust has perhaps made leadership a less lonely experience than it has been in some other contexts but every one of our heads has nevertheless faced difficult decisions. I know how much they have agonised in balancing the mission of the school with the wellbeing of their staff. And they have also worked so hard. It means a huge amount to them to have the support and loyalty of their teams and our solidarity together has been a massive help.

This staff newsletter tells some of our story over this last term but can only capture a fraction of what we have done. I feel intensely proud of our work together and on behalf of our Board I extend a sincere thank you to you for your commitment, achievements and resilience. As we anticipate that January will be a significant challenge it is all the more important to do our best to have a proper break over the holiday.

#### I wish you a very Happy Christmas and hope that you and your families will stay well and enjoy time together, even if that is on zoom!

- Problems at work





## All-weather pitch at Gordano School

Gordano School's new all-weather playing surface is now ready for play. The pitch will be used by students during the school day as well as hosting local hockey and football clubs after school and at the weekends. T

his project has only been made possible thanks to substantial financial support from some of the school's key partnership organisations (GSCT (Gordano School Community Trust), Sport England, National Hockey Foundation and North Somerset Hockey) for which the school is extremely grateful. Now our students, members of the community and local sporting clubs can all enjoy this high-quality playing surface for club hockey, football training and curriculum use.

Highlights of the pitch include - new floodlights, covered spectator viewing areas and changing facilities. Headteacher Tom Inman said "The all-weather pitch is an integral and essential part of delivering the curriculum and as a community resource and I am extremely grateful to our partners in helping us futureproof our school facilities."



#### New Build at Backwell School takes shape

Incredible progress is being made on the new sports hall and classrooms at Backwell School. The project is due to be completed in May 2021 with the school benefitting from a new Sport England compliant sports hall, new sciences labs, classrooms and changing facilities.

Finally, they learnt about Mendhi patterns and how hands are decorated with patterns using henna. The children then had a go at painting their own on a piece of paper.






# Regional recognition for HLTA colleague

#### Mindfulness at St Mary's, Portbury

The INSET day at the start of this academic year saw the staff team lying down (at a safe distance!) in the main hall and visualising something that was very important to them.

Skilfully led by Andy Baker, they deepened their understanding of the importance of developing skills of self-regulation in our children and providing still moments throughout the school day to pause and reflect. It was a really wonderful way to start the new year, not only because it served as a reminder of the importance of well-being for us all, but it bought the school community together at such a challenging time.

Classes are now exploring mindful exercises each day and Andy Baker has led some engaging sessions alongside staff. We are keen to see the longer term impact of mindful moments at St Mary's.

Some thoughts from a few of our Year 5/6 children:

Mindfulness is:

- is being calm
- is being peaceful
- helps you calm down when you are feeling excited
- you can use it before a test to calm yourself down
- if you're a bit stressed and you need a bit of a break, you can listen to some mindfulness for 5 or 10 minutes, then come back to the real world when you feel better
